CLUES THAT IT MAY BE TIME TO CLOSE:

- The care receiver's (CR's) behavior shows that he/she has pretty much recovered from the crisis that brought you together.
- Your CR no longer has crucial problems to discuss and does not appear to be hiding any.
- Your CR is consistently, genuinely happy.

What to do When you Notice Clues: PRAY; CONSULT WITH SUPERVISION GROUP; IF IN DOUBT, CONTINUE

NORMAL CLOSURE:

- 1. Anticipatory Socialization
- 2. Someone Brings Up Closure
- 3. Stephen Minister (SM) Discusses Closure with the Supervision Group
- 4-6. SM discusses, agrees on, and prepares for Closure with CR
- 7. Look Back and Look Forward
- 8. Conduct Final Visit
- 9. SM Follows Up with CR (or not)

ELEMENTS OF THE FINAL VISIT:

- Remind the CR that this is the final visit.
- Review the caring relationship
- Talk about feelings.
- Leave the door open.
- Impart hope.
- Mark the occasion.
- Say goodbye
- Plan follow up: Visits, Social meeting, phone calls OR no follow-up.

STEPHEN MINISTER CLOSES WITH HIS/HER PEER GROUP:

Schedule a closing with your peer group. Write out answers to the following questions before the meeting:

- What worked?
- What was challenging?
- Knowing what you know now, what would you change?
- How have YOU changed?
- What will you miss?
- How can the group support you?
